### Hyland's toughest test

### Danny Flexen says Eddie should not underestimate Fagan

THE FIGHTING Hyland brothers — Eddie, Patrick and Paul — are a bit further along the professional trail than the subject of this week's Big Feature, the Walshes. Tomorrow (Saturday, July 25) at the National Basketball Arena in Dublin they attempt to take another step up, with Eddie Hyland, 12-1 (4), getting the toughest test against Oklahoma's Dublin-born former Amir Khan victim Oisin Fagan.

The vacant IBF International superfeatherweight belt is at stake and this will be Fagan's debut at 9st 4lbs. Oisin may have gone down in just two rounds against Khan but Amir was superb that night and Fagan suffered a broken ankle in the first round, falling awkwardly during the first of two knockdowns.

Fagan had never been demolished like that before and taken good fighters

like undefeated former world champ Paul Spadafora the (10-round) distance. Now 23-6 (14), Fagan came back well from Khan and his injury to stop Bulgarian Asen Vasilev in five in May.

Eddie has also returned stronger from his 2006 four-round retirement defeat by Stephen Mullin, beating Kevin O'Hara on points for the Irish title last year. O'Hara and Mullin aside, Hyland's record is stacked with journeymen.

Hyland is seven years younger at 28 and although he cannot compete with Fagan's quality of opposition, in such close fights you should side with the man on the way up. That is Eddie, also the better technician, and he can take a close 12-round decision.

Sweden-based Ugandan Abdu
Tebazalwa, 14-4-1 (9), for the same title
at feather. Tebazalwa has been 12
rounds twice and never been stopped.
That includes a split defeat by monstrous Mongolian Choi.

Patrick can box and bang, but this is a step up and he can win on points.

Finally, Paul Hyland, 14-1 (4) and the youngest at 24, has an eightrounder with Bradford's 7-2-2 (0) Robert Nelson at around bantam. This is Hyland's biggest test since being outscored over four in the US by unsung Puerto Rican Lucian Gonzalez last year. He can score a late stoppage over Nelson, who returned from an 18-month hiatus only in March.

# Feathers to fly in Redhill

FORMER British and Commonwealth super-bantamweight champion Michael Alldis stages a show tomorrow (Saturday, July 25) at Liquid and Envy nightclub in Redhill, Surrey.

Main event sees **Ben Jones**, 7-1 (2) and a Crawley man like Alldis, face Reading journeyman **Ibrar Riyaz** over 10 rounds for the vacant International Masters featherweight title.

Jones' only defeat was a first-round stoppage by unsung Latvian Eduards Krauklis, who has not won since.

Riyaz, 3-5-1 (1), drew with the unbeaten Liam Shinkwin last time out and will be fit and motivated. He could spring an upset.

### Cox at home

PROMOTER Keith Mayo, the man who brought boxing back to Swindon, puts on a show at the Oasis Leisure Centre tonight (Friday, July 24), headlined by hometown hero and Commonwealth Games gold medallist (2006) Jamie Cox.

Southpaw Cox, 11-0 (7) and promoted by Frank Warren, was hugely impressive last time out, in April, stopping tough Brummie Mark Lloyd in eight rounds.

Tonight, Cox gets Ghanaian **Stephen Okine**, 10-8-1 (6) and who, according to *BoxRec*, has lost his last four, two of them by knockout.

Cox can win inside the distance.

# Segura aims to impress

A BIG show tomorrow (Saturday July 25) in Nayarit, Mexico, at the Grand Mayan, sees WBA light-flyweight champ **Giovanni Segura** make his first defence since being upgraded from interim status against Filipino **Sonny Boy Jaro**.

Mexican Segura, 20-1-1 (16), was undoubtedly the favoured fighter when he took on Colombian Cesar Canchila for the interim strap in July last year. However, Canchila outboxed the Mexican to take his unbeaten record on the Miguel Cotto-Antonio Margarito Las Vegas bill.

Segura looked superb in their March rematch, though, dropping Canchila twice and stopping him in the fourth. Jaro, 30-7-5 (19), will come to fight

Jaro, 30-7-5 (19), will come to fight but tends to lose at top level. Segura can halt the Filipino by the seventh.

Also on the bill, 26-year-old unbeaten Mexican lightweight **Urbano Antillon** bids for the interim WBA title against Venezualan **Miguel Acosta**, 25-3-2 (19).

Antillon, 26-0 (19), has destroyed fringe contenders like Bobby Pacquiao and Daniel Attah on the way up.

Acosta has won his last 15, including outpointing future WBA holder Jose Alfaro but Antillon is the prospect and he's at home, so he should win.

Former WBC heavyweight champion Sam Peter, fading fast, takes on journeyman Marcus McGee.

### Privilege to know Caldwell


IT is with deep regret and sadness that I learned of the passing of a great champion and lovely person in Johnny Caldwell. I had the privilege to manage him after he lost his world title to Eder Jofre.

About a year had elapsed since he lost his title when he contacted me but I was unsure he really wanted to continue boxing, as he had announced his retirement. So I left it a month and he contacted me again and told me if I wasn't interested he would seek another manager. It was then I knew he wanted to continue, so I signed him.

We won the British title and our association was as good as you could get. He was a great family man and a devout Catholic. When he came to London to fight he stayed at my home and I had to take him to church for the 10am mass every day. He never missed it.

He told me many times — and I regrettably agreed — that he wished I had managed him from the time he first turned professional. He had so much class and was such a remarkable talent. But he made so very little money from his career and a better professional it would be difficult to find.

Of all the boxers I have managed – and there have been many – none knew their bodies like Johnny. He could tell to the day when he needed to reduce his gym work or sparring or to change his food intake so that he came in and was strong at the weight.

# Kenny stays on track for Milan

### Thomas Myler on how Ireland's Olympic silver medallist came through the Worlds box-offs

BEIJING Olympics silver medallist **Kenneth Egan** is on track for a place on Ireland's team for the Worlds in Milan from September 1-12.

Winner of a record seven Irish lightheavy titles after previously holding two middle championships, Egan was never in any trouble in the finals of the Irish ABA's Open Senior competition. He scored a third-round win over fellow-Dubliner **Darren Cruise** at the National Stadium.

Cruise was trailing 6-1 after the opening round and 15-1 after the second before the Crumlin boxer's corner wisely retired their man.

"I got him with some good body shots," said Egan. "Everything is coming together nicely now for the Worlds and I'm happy with myself. There's a multinations coming up in France on August 18 and I'll be there."

The stylish Neilstown southpaw, considered the best light-heavy in the 98-year history of the Irish ABA, has a remarkable record of never having lost to a home opponent in just over 10 years.

In a repeat of the Irish Seniors final in February, Dublin light-welter **Philip Sutcliffe** had a decisive 21-6 win over Athy's **John Joe Joyce**, a three-time national champion.

Beijing Olympian Joyce was simply overpowered by the promising Sutcliffe, 19, a son of the same-name former two-time European bronze medallist and three-weights Irish champion in the 1970s.

In another duplicate of a final, Wicklow's European bronze medallist and former national champion Ross Hickey reversed February's result with a 4-3 win over Athy lightweight Eric Donovan

Hickey came from a 1-0 deficit in the opening round before gradually moving 2-1 ahead after two to take a close, if deserved decision.

Two Beijing Olympians received

walkovers: Belfast light-fly bronze medallist **Paddy Barnes** and Cavan bantam **John Joe Nevin**.

Dublin flyweight Conor Ahern, who failed the regain the national title in February, came back as a winner with an impressive 12-4 decision over Belfast's Ruari Dalton.

Ahern began well with sharp combinations from both gloves and built up a 5-0 lead after the first round, stretching it to 7-2 after the second.

The Irish ABA used the competition as a guide to selecting the team for the Worlds.
