

Sinclair keen on Duddy date



AN intriguing clash between John **Duddy and Belfast veteran Neil** Sinclair, who recently beat Mayo's Henry Coyle for the Irish light-middleweight title, is on the cards.

Sinclair said he "would love the fight" and his manager, John Breen, is keen on making it happen.

"Duddy lost his last fight and maybe in some way he has been found out at middleweight. Wonderful exhibition of 'Fighting Irishmen'

FIGHT fans looking for a summer treat might consider making a trip to Omagh, in Co Tyrone, to view 'The Fighting Irishmen' exhibition which opened at the Ulster American Folk Park this week.

The eclectic exhibition of boxing memorabilia is a celebration of the Irishmen and sons of Irishmen who made an important contribution to American history through the power of their fists.

DISPLAYS

Included in the displays are John L Sullivan's fur coat, Gene Tunney's punchbag, Jack Dempsey's jacket, Wayne McCullough's WBC title belt, and items loaned by Barry McGuigan, John Duddy and Gerry Cooney.

Sure to attract special attention is Dan Donnelly's preserved right arm, cut off after the celebrated Irish bare-knuckle champion's grave was raided in 1820. The exhibition is the brainchild of American businessman and boxing fan James J Houlihan, who first arranged to have it staged at the Irish Arts Center in New York three years ago before switching it to Boston College.

The latest move to the Ulster American Folk Park has

created enormous interest and there are hopes of the exhibition coming to a Dublin location when its run ends in Omagh on November 29.

DUNER IMBOAS TILE CHAOS REGNS

THE WORLD Boxing Association continues to featherweight, and if that happens it should work in mysterious ways. Take the case of Bernard Dunne, who seems to own just half of that organisation's world title - or is it a third?

While I attempt to explain the convoluted situation, bear in mind that every time the WBA approves a fight with a title tag, they pick up sanctioning fees from the fighters and promoters. That's the bottom line.

Dunne was proclaimed WBA superbantamweight champion in March after his sensational knockout of Ricardo Cordoba, only to find he was still rated No 2 in the division by that organisation.

The No 1 spot still belongs to Celestino Caballero. He was already the WBA champion and, by then adding the International Boxing Federation title, was promoted to WBA 'super' champion.

So now there were two WBA super-bantam champions, right? Why not make it three? OK, Thailand's Poonsawat Kratingdaengym has been declared WBA 'interim' champion after a victory last month.

ly, most of us thought an interim champion was a sort of 'caretaker' until an incapacitated champion recovered. But neither Caballero nor Dunne was injured, so that dispensed with that theory.

Now there's talk of Caballero moving up to

confirm Dunne as outright WBA champion. Except there's still the matter of dealing with Poonsawat's his name!

The heavyweight situation is equally absurd, to the exasperation of both Nicolai Valuev and Ruslan Chagaev, who were due to battle it out in Helsinki, Finland, tonight to decide who is the true WBA champion.

The fight was called off yesterday after Chagaev was unable to fulfil the Finnish Boxing Federation's medical requirements. Finnish law prevents disclosures, but it has been consistently rumoured that Chagaev had contracted Hepatitis B.

Chagaev had won the WBA title by beating the previously undefeated Valuev on a majority decision two years ago. They were due to meet again later that year when Chagaev took ill.

He then suffered a ruptured Achilles tendon, forcing another postponement, so the WBA declared Chagaev 'champion in recess' while recognising Valuev as champion after beating John Ruiz last August.

"It made me very angry that when I was injured, Valuev simply got my world championship," Chagaev complained earlier

"Normally a boxer is named interim champion until a champion is fit, but that didn't happen."

The Uzbekistan fighter returned to the ring in February to defeat Carl Davis Drummond and showed his displeasure at the situation by having 'The Real Champion' printed on the back of his t-shirt.

He had predicted of tonight's scheduled fight: "I have beaten Valuev once and I will beat him again. I am the champion."

Valuey, the tallest fighter in the world at 7ft. had boasted that he would show he was the real champion. He felt he had improved a lot since the first fight.

The possibility of finding a late replacement for Chagaev was explored, with Kali Meehan or Lamon Brewster lined up, but there simply wasn't enough time to complete the arrangements. The entire show was called off.

US promoter Don King, who was due to fly in to Helsinki today, has now demanded that the WBA declare Valuev the undisputed champion.

"Nikolai has been patient in waiting for Chagaev to become medically fit to fight," said
